E te whānau ngā mihi mahana ki a koutou katoa

"He oranga ngākau, he pikinga waiora. Positive feelings in your heart will raise your sense of self-worth."

This whakatauki is at the heart of the health and physical education learning area. It embodies hauora — a Māori philosophy of holistic well-being that is also recognised by the World Health Organisation.

Here at North Street School we utilise a Maori Kaupapa framework created by Sir Mason Durie called '**Te Whare Tapa Whā**', which includes four pillars or pou; **taha wairua/**spiritual wellbeing, **taha hinengaro**/mental and emotional wellbeing, **taha tinana**/physical wellbeing and **taha whānau**/family and social wellbeing. There are a number of programmes running here at NSS that take into consideration these pou which are well underway.

Under the pillar or pou, of taha tinana, the children have been practising over the term the different disciplines of athletics, shot put, discus, long jump, high jump and running, in preparation for next week's North Street School Athletics Day. Please come along to support your children competing in the various events. House loyalties will be shown with children sporting their house colours. Important to note, we are very lucky to have a number of Feilding High School students who will be supporting with the various events. Their involvement will be greatly appreciated and very valuable.

Finally, the North Street School Charter has been completed and sent into the Ministry of Education. This includes our; Strategic Plan, Annual Plan, Māori Achievement Plan, e-Learning Plan, the Analysis of Variance and the Targets for 2024. These headings are dictated by the ministry and will be loaded onto the NSS Website shortly. While you are there, the school policies that are currently up for review are on the School Docs site, the password and username are also kept on the website for your convenience. Current expectations around; one hour Reading, Writing and Maths, Attendance and No Phone policies, have been unpacked with staff as mandated by the new government.

Our future aspirations and achievement challenges are informed by our previous work, Sir Mason Durie's Te Whare Tapa Whā model, Russell Bishop's research on relationship building, Te Mātairangi (the guiding kaupapa) of Te Mātaiaho and Te Whāriki. Our 2023-2026 Achievement Challenges focus on: Whakawhanaungatanga (the process of building relationships) and Akongja (learning), as referenced in Tataiako, Ka Hikitia and Te Hiringa o Te Mahara (Ngāti Kauwhata Education Strategy).

Our Kähui Ako values the concept of topūtanga - where groups collaborate, with shared aspirations and values, to contribute to, and strengthen a sense of identity, well-being and educational outcomes.

• Challenge 2: Ākongia | Learning


Nā tō manaaki, nā tōku manaaki, ka puawai mai ngā kākano With your care, and my care, the seed will grow
